- "Success"







The Bible was from a High-Context Culture:

Jesus told a story (Mt 13:3)

A farmer went out to sow his seed. ⁴ As he was scattering the seed, some fell along the path, and the birds came and ate it up. ⁵ Some fell on rocky places, where it did not have much soil. It sprang up quickly, because the soil was shallow.


- Jesus tells us nothing about how farmers sow seeds.
- ⁸ Still other seed fell on good soil, where it produced a crop—a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown. ⁹ Whoever has ears, let them hear."

The Bible was from a High-Context Culture Let's do another story, where the Bible assumes you know what everybody knew.

The Lamb opens all Seven Seals:

- (1) The Executor of the Will.
- (2) The Heir.
- (3) Witness #1
- (4) Witness #2
- (5) Witness #3
- (6) Witness #4
- (7) Witness #5

So what point does John want us to catch?

- John wants us to see three things:
- (1) Jesus is the Heir.
- (2) Jesus is the Executor of the Will.
- (3) Only Jesus was there to be a witness to the original will.

Most Collectivist Cultures have:

- Common primary cultural values:
 - Kinship
 - Patronage
 - Brokerage/Mediation

- Common ways or tools or buckets to hold, teach, enforce and reinforce those values
 - Honor
 - Shaming
 - Boundaries

Kinship

"You can pick your friends, but you can't pick your family."

Patronage

"Don't patronize me!"

Brokerage

"Cut out the middleman!"

Honor

"Honor killings are categorically bad."

Shame


"It is always wrong to shame someone!"

Boundaries

"Don't fence me in!"

So, let's look at a biblical passage, where a cultural value influenced how I read it.


- Cultural values are like an iceberg.
- I have an American understanding of "rules."
- We don't talk about it, but it impacts how I read rules in the Bible.



Rules/Relationships


American "rules" about Rules:

- Rules have to always apply.
 (Otherwise they are "broken.")
- Rules must apply to everyone (Otherwise they are "unfair.")

and God isn't broken)



- I commend to you our sister Phoebe, a deacon in the church (Rom 16:1, NIV)







Luke 21 As Jesus looked up, he saw the rich putting their gifts into the temple treasury. ² He also saw a poor widow put in two very small copper coins. ³ "Truly I tell you," he said, "this poor widow has put in more than all the others. ⁴ All these people gave their gifts out of their wealth; but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on."
